

Rueben Martínez of Librería Martínez Speaks Out on Education

At the invitation of the Friends of the Library and the Alumni Association, Rueben Martínez spoke on September 19th in the Wilshire Auditorium about the importance of education and literacy to a receptive audience composed of 100 faculty, staff, administrators and community members. In his presentation, Martínez emphasized the need for the Latino community to have access to books and to nurture the love of reading in order to succeed in life. Martínez became the first bookseller to receive the MacArthur “genius” award, a \$500,000 fellowship from the MacArthur Foundation. Martínez was honored for “fusing the roles of marketplace and community center to inspire appreciation of literature and preserve Latino literary heritage.”

Martínez started out as a barber providing reading material for his customers. Since he found that he needed to continually restock his supply of magazines and books, he decided to start selling them. What began as a sideline turned into a full-time occupation called the Librería Martínez Books and Art Galleries. From its humble origins in a Santa Ana barber shop, the Librería Martínez has grown to three locations including a children’s bookstore. As a leading advocate of education and literacy in the Latino community, Martínez was a founder of the Latino Book and Family Festival along with actor Edward James Olmos. It is now the country’s largest Spanish-language book exposition.

Grants for Digitizing Archival Photographs

As the oldest continuously-operating community college in the state, Fullerton College is in the unique position of possessing an archival collection that documents a history spanning nearly a century. The archival collection includes historic photographic images, student newspapers since 1923, hundreds of paper documents dating from 1913 and other ephemera. The photographic collection vividly illustrates the astonishing societal changes that occurred during the college’s existence. Unfortunately, these historical treasures have been generally inaccessible to the public due to a lack of proper housing and

funding. Now that the library has moved into its new location with an archival room, the historic collection is being made available for research on a limited basis. To expand access to the archival material, the Fullerton College Library has received two grants for 2006-2007, one through the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) from the California State Library and the second from the campus Dynamic Fund program, to digitize, catalog and make available through the Library’s web site 400 of the historic photographs. These two grants will provide the initial funding and groundwork so the Library can begin its long-term goal of digitizing and cataloguing all of the archival collection, with the most important items available online by the Fullerton College centennial in 2013. The digitized format will allow these materials to be made widely accessible on the web and will also preserve the original documents from deterioration. The grant funding will pay for an outside vendor to scan and digitize the 400 photographs, which represents a small portion of the collection.

Retirements

John Ayala retired after serving as Fullerton College's Dean of the Library for 16 years during which he oversaw the construction of the new library. John earned his Master in Library Science from Immaculate Heart College as well as a Master of Public Administration from California State University Long Beach. Prior to his tenure at Fullerton College, John spent 18.5 years at Long Beach City College as Director of the Pacific Coast Campus Library. He also served as President of the Academic Senate for two years and helped found REFORMA, a professional association which helps extend library services to Spanish-speaking individuals. In addition to his duties as Dean of the Library, John also served as Study Abroad Program Administrator, President of the district's Latino Faculty & Staff Association and Kindercaminata Chairperson. He has also assumed responsibility for Media Services and the college's television learning program at various times. Although John is enjoying retirement, he has not left the library altogether; you can sometimes find him manning the Friends of the Library store! He also serves as the recording secretary of the Friends. In addition, he is representing REFORMA on the executive committee of the Joint Conference of Librarians of Color as well as working as consultant to the organizing committee of the

Sandra Smith earned two degrees from California State University Fullerton, a Master of Library Science and a Master of Arts in American Studies.
