All proceeds go to the Friends of the Fullerton College Library. Through these types of fund-raising efforts, the Friends were able to purchase a subscription to the McNaughton Book Service that leases books to libraries. This new Best Sellers

collection provides students, faculty and Friends with a collection of current fiction and non-fiction titles. One Book, One College: True Notebooks by Mark Salzman

One Book, One College is a campus-wide reading program that focuses on a common book to encourage reading, critical thinking and discussion. The goal is to unite the college through the shared experience of reading the same book at the same time in classrooms and around campus.

Fullerton College took nominations from students, faculty and staff. The One Book, One College committee sought titles that would appeal to a broad, diverse group of people and would inspire discussion across a variety of disciplines. The committee narrowed the field down to five books. During the Spring 2008 semester, the campus voted for the One Book, One College title and selected True Notebooks by Mark Salzman.

In <u>True Notebooks</u>, Mark Salzman is invited to visit a writing class at the Los Angeles County Central Juvenile Hall, a detention facility for "high-risk" juvenile offenders charged mostly with murder. Despite his initial misgivings, Salzman is recruited by the persuasive Sister Janet and ends up teaching his own writing workshop at the facility. Salzman recounts his alternately amusing, frustrating, enlightening, depressing and touching interactions with the student inmates and the staff. The book includes student essays that give the reader an insight into the juvenile inmates' pasts, fears, regrets and hopes.

Mark Salzman is an awardwinning novelist and nonfiction author who has written on a variety of subjects, from a novel about a Carmelite nun's ecstatic visions and crisis of faith to a compelling memoir about growing up a misfit (One Book, One College Cont.)

in a Connecticut suburb - clearly displaying a range that transcends genre. Common to each of his works is a theme of how people struggle to reach an ideal but often fall short, and the quiet change that takes place in facing the discouragement and the possibility of never achieving their goal. Salzman writes with honesty and warmth, combined with a sharp sense of humor. As a boy, all Salzman ever wanted was to be a Kung Fu master, but it was his proficiency on the cello that facilitated his acceptance to Yale at the age of 16. He soon changed his major to Chinese language and philosophy, which took him to mainland China where he taught English for two years and studied martial arts. He never gave up music, though, and Salzman's cello playing appears on the soundtrack to several films, including the Academy Award-winning documentary Breathing Lessons: The Life and Work of Mark O'Brien. He has also played with Yo-Yo Ma and pianist Emanuel Ax at Lincoln Center. Salzman even dared to play the cello at the Los Angeles County Central Juvenile Hall.

Mark Salzman will be speaking at Fullerton College on April 22nd. More details in the March issue of *Overdue*.
